

# Every and their

*“Every”* is singular (as in Spanish), as is everything, everybody, and everyone.

**However, you may have heard the following:**

- “Every student must bring their books to school” and “everyone must pay their taxes in Tenerife”.

**These two sentences are incorrect.**

In these two examples, the speaker has confused the pronoun “their”. In English it is a **plural pronoun**, not singular.

**“Every”** is third person (la tercera persona) and singular.

**So the correct forms are:**

- “everyone must pay his taxes in Tenerife” and “every student must bring his book to school”.
